We hope that this Newsletter will further enhance all members' understanding and appreciation of all that is going on in our two games throughout the country.

Courts on the Way Up!



It has been a hectic few weeks on the courts front with a number of exciting new projects at various stages of completion. The building of four new rugby fives courts is currently underway at Oundle School which is the highest number of new courts to be built in one location for well over 30 years. The photos show work at its early stages but the roofs are now on and the plastering work has just started. The courts, which will form part of the school's sports centre, will be formally opened in May but may be available for playing in March. The existing courts will regrettably be demolished but the new facilities will undoubtedly help to heighten the profile of the game at the school.

The RFA recently became aware of the existence of three unused roofless courts (pictured overleaf) at King Charles 1 school in Worcester, where the School Council has asked for the courts to be refurbished. Estimates are currently being obtained.

In a similar vein the six courts at Stoke Newington, which are also currently roofless, are shortly to have a major overhaul. A new roof covering all six courts will be added, new doors

installed, the walls will be replastered and a new finish will be put on the floors.

Through the Old Boys' Society of Heversham Grammar School, the RFA has been advised of the decision by the school to revive Fives there. Heversham, previously a Grammar school until 1984, is now a split-site Comprehensive currently providing boarding facilities for some 60 pupils (boys and girls). The court (pictured below) is somewhat dilapidated and used as a tennis wall and kick around facility. Estimates are currently being obtained for the required remedial work to which the RFA has agreed to contribute.

In other court news, planning consents are being sought for enclosing the courts at Sedbergh and the Evans House court there has been renovated. Anyone who has suffered the condensation problems

at Sedbergh will appreciate what a transformation this could make. Blundell's too are considering enclosing some or all of their courts which would have similar results.

Thanks to the persistence of Steve Korris, two courts at Leeds University have now been fully restored and are available for play. Discussions are taking place about improving the courts at both Giggleswick school and at Halifax.

Work continues to try and persuade those schools e.g Haileybury, Felsted, who have courts but don't play, to revitalise the game through the provision of coaching facilities. Having funds available through the Charitable Trust has enabled us to be far more proactive in offering assistance to schools.

Revival at Wolverhampton G.S.

After a decade without regular fives, Wolverhampton Grammar School has once again embraced the game.

As an Old Wulfrunian, I rediscovered Fives four years ago after a 10-year break following University. The power of the Internet and the Eton Fives website led me to Andrew Mitchell and the Shrewsbury Monday Club. The Monday Club and Salopian fives has ensured a good standard of competition in the Midlands. A meeting with Howard Wiseman at the Northern Championships in February 2006 suggested that it may be possible to rekindle Fives at W.G.S.

Richard Barber arranged a meeting with the Head, Bernard Trafford, and the Head of P.E. John Johnson in November 2006. I accompanied Richard and received a warm welcome from both Bernard and John. The School had built new courts adjacent to a new Sports Hall in the mid 1990's. Originally there were six courts with excellent lighting and covered backcourt area. One of the courts has subsequently been converted into a climbing wall, leaving five courts ready and waiting to be played on.

Both Bernard and John were keen to see fives played on a regular basis and make use of the excellent facilities that had been lying dormant. The enthusiasm at the meeting ensured that cooperation and funding were readily agreed between the Eton Fives Charitable Trust, the E.F.A., the R.E.F.C.A. and Wolverhampton Grammar School.

December 2006 saw me at the front of the Junior Assembly explaining the merits of Eton Fives to a group of 180 boys and girls. We followed up with

two after school taster sessions that provided the pupils with an opportunity to come and have a go at a new sport. The taster sessions saw all the courts full and over 30 pupils enjoying a new challenge. The success of the taster sessions has seen Fives introduced to Year 7 Games and an After School Fives Club established. Although it is still early days there is definitely enthusiasm to seeing fives re-established in a school that has had such a prolific past.

City Fives Association Report

2007 is the year that the CFA gets serious. We are putting structures in place to ensure that we are able to expand the association and target five London boroughs from September this year. This means focusing on three areas; attracting funding, incorporating as a charitable company, and making our work in London schools sustainable.

Full-time coaches and administrative staff are essential if the CFA is to continue expanding its work in London schools. Therefore, we have set ourselves the target of raising £50,000 from corporate and charitable sources by September. We have been conducting research until now with professional fundraisers, trusts and corporate social responsibility departments and are now in a position to start approaching potential sponsors. A major retail bank, the Youth Sports Trust, and a charitable foundation have already indicated their interest in the CFA, and we are confident of achieving the target.

To continue attracting this level of funding we are applying to become a charitable company. This will formalize the association and give our sponsors the confidence to continue supporting us long-term. It is also important to have a

committed and experienced board in place and the CFA trustees will be made up from a combination of current CFA board members and other supporters with experience from business, sports and charitable sectors.

None of this will be possible though unless we can continue proving that 1-wall Fives is sustainable and meets a need for London schools. To do this we launched a school membership scheme which provides schools with support to set up after-school clubs, mark out courts and train staff. The scheme started in Kensington and Chelsea with schools that received free coaching and we already have 5 member schools and a further 10 interested. Links have also been

established with the Lambeth Healthy Schools partnership to begin coaching this summer.

Fives Online and the Ladder Competition

Fives Online, a new online portal, has quickly become an important hub for the Eton Fives community since it was launched in September. The website (www.fivesonline.co.uk) brings together previously 'scattered' information, such as the fives fixture list, as well as club and court information aimed at active players or those returning to the game. It has also become an active online network with over 260 people registered to the website. With players' contact details easily available via a player directory, people are using the site to keep in touch with each other and arrange matches. Fives Online has also helped players returning to the game after many years to integrate with the rest of the community and find opportunities to get back on court.

In addition, Fives Online works hand in hand with the new Ladder Competition. Players sign up to participate in any Ladder event via the website; it then tracks how players climb up or slide down the ladder as they win or lose in a series of time limited encounters. It really has proved to be an exciting and popular format. There have been 6 rounds in the Ladder so far with an average of 6 courts in use and almost 80 players involved. Even players who have been on the scene for a while have been surprised by the number of 'new faces' turning up at Ladder events. Thus, the Ladder along with Fives Online has had a big impact on both increasing participation and drawing together previously disparate groups.

The EFA is keen to further develop Fives Online. The ambitions for 2007 include:

- improving the club and court information sections
- increasing the number of players registered to the site, especially students and sixth-formers about to leave school
- encouraging tournament organisers to make better use of the site to advertise and recruit for major tournaments

RFA President's Note...

Last year my theme was that the game of Rugby Fives was in pretty good health as regards the number of enthusiastic players at various different levels (school, university and senior), but that there were still obvious dangers such as the loss of courts at Sutton Valence last year driven, ultimately, by an insufficient number of well supported coaches in schools that have the facilities. The potential loss of courts is still a serious concern in other schools such as Haileybury and Rutlish, but perhaps overall the tide is beginning to turn somewhat as there are also a number of positive and exciting developments affecting rugby fives courts as mentioned elsewhere in this newsletter.

We have tried to encourage more coaching, by holding a coaching day for coaches at St. Paul's School in September. More of these events will be held if there is any demand. A dozen or so masters attended, and it was good to see, amongst others, Bedford Modern well represented as well as the Pilgrims prep school. Extending fives into more prep

schools which have easy access to courts seems to me to be an initiative that should be strongly encouraged, as it will help to ensure a good playing base in schools at the more senior level.

Following Denise Hall Wilton's retirement from the Board in June we are delighted to welcome Melanie Whitehead (pictured) onto the Board. Whilst female fives is not

strongly supported in many locations, there are some positive examples, such as Blundells School, which show that it could become more popular and the Board is keenly aware that it needs to do all that it can to help to encourage the development of female fives, especially in schools in the first instance. Having Melanie's input will certainly be a big help in this respect.



Staying with Board members for the moment I would like particularly to thank Ian Roberts for taking up David Barnes' mantle so successfully in producing (with Mike Fenn of the EFA) this year's Annual Report. I believe the Joint Report is a great step forward for both games.

This note would not be complete without a reference to One Wall Fives, which is being steadily developed in London Boroughs, and is hopefully going to raise enough finance to put it on a more professional footing. If it gets going it will certainly benefit all forms of fives in the longer run. More on that too elsewhere.

Lastly congratulations to Matt Cavanagh for regaining his singles title with some impressive precision play; and a note for the diary to attend the 80th anniversary dinner of the RFA (referred to elsewhere) at Queens Club with your partner on 29th September 2007. I look forward to seeing many of you there.

EFA February Newsletter 2007 – Chairman's Report

This Newsletter marks the third anniversary of my taking over as Chairman of the Eton Fives Association. I said when I did so that I defined three main priorities –

- (i) to make sure that the "engine house" of the game is running well – in the schools, the clubs, the management and popularity of the competitions; and the good ordering of the Association and its Board.
- (ii) to ensure that the Westway project is supported, healthy and growing
- (iii) to develop a forward strategy for Eton Fives, as a framework for directing the scarce resources of the Association to the areas which will most benefit the game nationally at this stage of its development.

I can report that in most of these areas the game is flourishing.

- Regarding the first, there is enthusiasm among those who organise the game in all its facets, good records of attendance in League, Ladder, matches and competitions, and a united and active Board composed of people from all walks of the game, with Sian Evans our most recently-appointed Director representing the growing importance of Ladies' Fives throughout the game.
- Regarding Westway, we have expanded the Fives coaching team in 2006, and over 300 people a week are now playing on the main courts, or in the One Wall version for which new courts have now been permanently marked out there.
- And the new Strategy for Eton Fives published in January 2005 has continued to drive new initiatives during 2006, notably in the fields of Schools Fives, the Ladder competition and the introduction of a dedicated Fives IT system – 'Fives Online' – which has the potential to revolutionise the game through the benefits it can bring for all our strategic objectives such as the managing matches, contacting people, tracking school leavers and expanding our player base.

The single most crucial element of the senior game is of course the Clubs, around which the whole game is structured. As stated later in this Newsletter, "there are too many of our Clubs which are just surviving, rather than thriving" and it is to support and strengthen this part of the "engine house" of Eton Fives that the EFA's main efforts and resources are already turning in 2007.

In January 2005 I wrote in the Newsletter:

"Our new Strategy will require great effort, and will involve Change. But 'Change' is just a nickname for 'Opportunity' for people who really believe in it. So this Strategy is about action and also about believing in something – namely the preservation and strengthening of the best court game in the world. Not a bad cause for which to ask everyone involved in the game to light a candle!"

Two years on I am excited by the progress we are making, confident of the success of our numerous initiatives to strengthen the game, greatly appreciative of the efforts of so many people to make it all work, and hugely grateful for the help and advice which I am constantly receiving personally in fulfilling my role.

Eton Fives Strategy Report

The Strategy for Eton Fives which was approved in 2005 had at its heart the encouragement and support of Fives at Schools, the essential base of the game. To this end the Chairman has visited the Headmasters of 28 schools in 2006, from which a number of exciting initiatives have flowed – not least the EFA's support for the resurrection of Fives at Wolverhampton Grammar School, formerly one of the leading Fives playing schools in the country.

A core part of our Schools' strategy is to encourage a much greater flow of school leavers into the senior game. We hope that Fives Online, the game's new interactive website where players can enter their own contact details and personal aspirations to play, will make a huge difference to this flow – as well as to the organisation of matches through the availability of an accurate and more substantial list of players.

Fives Online is also enabling the new Ladder to prosper, a key initiative as a regular source of friendly, accessible Fives enabling participants to find matches throughout the season at their own standard of play.

Our priorities are now focusing on the Clubs, where there remain too many merely surviving rather than thriving. The strength of the game at Club level is a key indicator of the strength of the game in the country as a whole, and here we must succeed in increasing the flow of school leavers into adult Fives, enable Clubs to identify, hold and expand their player numbers, and ensure robust management, motivation and membership. This focus will be a high priority for the EFA during the rest of 2007.

I read with interest your article "Fives in Australia". I was educated at Nelson College, New Zealand, and I enjoyed playing Eton fives during lunch breaks, I remember well the damage to hands it caused. They have 5 courts, 4 still in use. I would suspect that several of the older more traditional schools in New Zealand – in Wellington, Christchurch and New Plymouth – would be the same. We played quadrangular tournaments in all sports annually.

Webmaster's Note: The courts are three sided with no back wall possibly without the step, buttress and ledges.

French Bid to Conker the World

In a recent article in the Times the French suggested that although "The British invented the game of conkers, we do it better." The article went on to list UK Sporting Exports including Hopscotch Tiddlywinks, Cricket, Cresta Run and Eton Fives. "Eton Fives originated with medieval Britons hitting balls against church walls. Courts are mostly in public schools in the UK, but also exist in Malaysia, Argentina and Nigeria."

World Handball Championships by Pete Cohen

Myself & James Toop had a taste of the international game in the World Handball Championships, Edmonton, Canada, in August. It's possible that we were naïve to enter the 'Open' division of the One-Wall, as the standard from the New Yorkers was incredible – needless to say we both lost in straight sets in the singles and doubles, although James managed to rattle his opponent enough to make him call a timeout.

The four-wall pitted James against a Basque player, both players experiencing four-wall for the first time, and James had an excellent game and only narrowly missed out on recording a win for England! In the doubles we played a Mexican pair, and had it been a best of 5 set game we could well have won, but the learning curve was a bit too steep. After being knocked out the Rockies provided a fantastic couple of days exploring, and there were some great social events throughout the tournament providing an opportunity to meet hundreds of handballers from all over the world. The next competition is 2009, in Portland, Oregon (USA), and it would be great to see as many fives players as possible there.

Mill Hill School

10 September, Old Millhillians Day, witnessed the formal opening of the three new Eton Fives courts at the School. Old Millhillians, School staff, Governors, EFA members, school boys, parents and friends gathered at the courts on what was a fine sunny day. The Headmaster, William Winfield, welcomed those present before asking Richard Barber, Chairman of the Eton Fives Association to formally open the courts. Andrew Summers spoke on behalf of the Old Millhillians whilst Steve Plummer, Master-in-charge of Fives at Mill Hill, acted as master of ceremonies. Champagne was served to mark the occasion whilst the spectators witnessed demonstration games of Fives by experienced and younger players.

The Rugby Fives Association Charitable Trust

The Rugby Fives Association Charitable Trust was launched in the summer of 2002 and has since then raised just over £50,000.

It has helped with the funding of four major projects – Derby Moor, Denstone, Clifton College and Loretto - with a total commitment of £26,000. Hence there is currently just over £25,000 on deposit but discussions are currently taking place to support a major refurbishment of the courts at Sedbergh.

In addition to these large projects the Trust would also like to support the provision of coaching at schools where fives is no longer

played and would also like to help establish fives within universities where the game has lapsed.

In the longer term a number of fives playing schools are considering upgrading or refurbishing their fives courts (leaking roofs seem to be the largest single problem) and without doubt being able to provide financial support does encourage schools to actually commit to these works.

RFA Tournaments Report
